# Dear WCWS Community,

We are delighted to present a summary of the key moments and achievements from the 11th World Conference on Women's Studies (WCWS) 2025, held in Bali, Indonesia, from May 29 to 30, 2025.

Under the theme "Talking Shop: Feminisms and the Crucial Issues of Our Times," the conference provided a dynamic platform for exploring several topics ranging from Women's Empowerment and Gender Equality to Feminist Analytical Lenses and Praxes. The event brought together a diverse group of scholars, researchers, activists, and practitioners from across the globe to engage in a comprehensive exploration of global feminisms, examining both the theoretical and practical dimensions of Women's Studies. The gathering provided a platform for the development of collaborative partnerships, facilitated publishing opportunities, and contributed to advancing the discourse on achieving a more equitable and just world.



#### Conference overview

For 2025, the 11th World Conference on Women's Studies (WCWS) was held under the theme, "Talking Shop: Feminisms and the Crucial Issues of Our Times". This theme was thoughtfully designed to address the most pressing issues within the field of Women's Studies today. In alignment with this theme, the paper submission tracks spanned a broad range of topics.

## **Research Paper Presentations**

Key highlight of the conference was the extensive range of highquality research papers presented by academics and industry experts. These papers covered a broad spectrum of topics, including, but not limited to;

#### Global Reach

This year, WCWS welcomed submissions from over **50 countries** across Asia, Africa, Europe, and beyond. The most significant number of papers came from Asia, underscoring the region's growing academic engagement. Reflecting global reach, the conference welcomed participants from over **30 countries**, including:

Australia, Barbados, Bangladesh, Canada, Cameroon, Chile, China, Greece, Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Jamaica, Japan, Jordan, Mexico, Nepal, Philippines, Portugal, Qatar, South Africa, Sri Lanka, Taiwan, Tanzania, Turkey, United Arab Emirates, United Kingdom, United States, Uganda, Uzbekistan, and Zimbabwe.

More than **100 universities** were represented, and the participant pool was equally diverse in roles and expertise including, University leadership (Deans, Heads of Departments), Faculty members and academic researchers, Doctoral and postgraduate students, Civil service professionals, Social and community activists.



#### **Post-Conference Publication Activities**

By the initial full paper submission deadline, a total of 25 participants submitted their full papers for further processing. An additional 15 authors are currently in the process of revising their manuscripts and have indicated their intention to submit shortly. Up to mid June date 58 participants have submitted the AIS copyright transfer form.

# "The Voice of Women in Bali"



As part of the WCWS mission to strengthen sustainable, grassroots communities, we organized a special visit to Bali Sruti—"The Voice of Women in Bali"—in connection with the 11th World Conference on Women's Studies (WCWS) 2025. This engagement underscores our commitment to supporting local initiatives that promote women's empowerment and advocacy. Bali Sruti was founded in 2004 by academician Luh Riniti Rahayu, gender expert and conference director Sita Van Bemmelen, and legal specialist Kusumawati. Comprising journalists, midwives, scholars, and lawyers, the organization's diverse expertise amplifies our collective efforts for a brighter future for women worldwide.

Initiated by Conference Chair Professor Diana Fox from an idea generated at the previous conference, the visit featured Professor Fox, TIIKM Co-founder and Conference Convener Mr. Isanka P. Gamage, and some other conference attendees. It was a productive discussion, learning about their programs, discussions with women who are survivors of domestic violence, homeless needing support.

Through this collaboration, Bali Sruti will join the Future of Women 2026 conference organized by TIIKM. As a special highlight of the partnership, Bali Sruti will be facilitating a "Storytelling Session"—a platform where they will share their experiences and insights with the global community attending the conference.

In addition, TIIKM will support the development of Bali Sruti's official website and journal website, further strengthening their digital presence. TIIKM will also assist them in identifying suitable reviewers to support the development of their academic journal.



### **Presentation Awards**

WCWS 2025 saw a significant number of paper submissions, with several outstanding works selected for presentation. Presenters were assessed by an expert evaluation panel based on a comprehensive set of criteria, including research quality, field contribution, originality, and time management. Final decisions regarding the award recipients were made under the careful oversight of the Conference Chair. Presenters were awarded under Superlative, Best Poster, Student Best and Overall Best categories, separately in physical and virtual platforms.
